2016 ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING MINUTES

President Lance Jacobson called the meeting to order at 9:50 am on February 14, 2016. A quorum was present.

Pastor Mark Rossman opened the meeting with a prayer.

A motion was made and seconded to accept the minutes of the 2016 Annual Meeting. The motion passed unanimously.

Vice President LeeAnn Land thanked and presented gifts to the council members who will be leaving the council because their terms have expired: President Lance Jacobson, Treasurer Kristi Winter, and Member-At-Large Wayne Burrus. President Lance said that it has been a wonderful council to work with. He also thanked Wayne for agreeing to continue to work on existing projects for the coming year.

President Lance noted that ballots had been passed out to elect new members to replace those whose terms have expired. Those nominated were Bob Ulland for President, Lee Stenehjem to move from Secretary to Treasurer, Don Pick for Secretary, and Jenny Dorsch and Phil Pounds as Members-At-Large. LeeAnn Land would remain as Vice President and Barbara Brooks would remain as a Member-At-Large until their respective terms expire at the annual meeting in 2017.

President Lance asked if there were further nominations from the floor. There being none, a motion was made and seconded that nominations be closed. The motion passed unanimously.

A motion was made that the nominees be elected by unanimous ballot. The motion was seconded and unanimously passed.

President Lance noted that, according to the church by-laws, as the new President Bob could not also be the council representative on the Call Committee. The council has asked Phil Pounds to take that position. A motion was made and seconded to name Phil as the council representative to the Call Committee. The motion passed unanimously.

Pastor's Report

Pastor Mark noted that his report was in the 2015 Annual Report. He said it is truly a blessing to be your pastor and that is because of those present.

He appreciates our faith, our ministry and our humor.

But we are at a turning point – a crossroads. We have chosen a Call Committee to find a Youth, Children, and Family Associate Pastor. We have a lot of older people as members. We need to attract more youth, children and families and we need a more balanced demographic ministry.

President Lance added that we greatly appreciate his presence with us, his spirituality, and his leadership in Christ. We have seen tremendous positive changes in the two years he has been with us.

President's Report

President Lance called attention to his report in the Annual Report. He appreciates the help that he, and the church, have received from volunteers and from those willing to come forth generously to help with our finances. Our growth has been approximately 10 % in membership and attendance. We need to remain focused on our mission work here in our area, in our synod and beyond.

Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Kristi's report is also in the Annual Report. She noted an outside financial audit was completed for which we received a good report. She thanked Janis Fjeld for her work over the past 12 years. We have met our budget and have a number of new things happening.

The Finance Committee met many times over the year and she thanked the members of that committee for their participation: Robert Winter, John Goesling, and Mark Anderson. They met to review the 2016 financial plan. She noted the budget does include an Associate Pastor for one-half year. There is a projected deficit of \$70,000 in the 2016 budget. The Finance Committee recommended the financial plan be adopted and the council has put it forward to the congregation.

Treasurer Kristi says it is time to step up and meet the budget.

A motion was made and seconded to accept the budget. In discussion, Treasurer Kristi said that supplemental donation cards had been sent out and some returned and there were more pledges to collect.

President Lance reported on an anonymous pledge of \$30,000 to help address the budget deficit. Any money which the church raised to help meet the deficit would be matched dollar-for-dollar by the \$30,000 gift up to the \$30,000. Pastor Mark noted that the matching gift was given to challenge the rest of the congregation to come forward.

Treasurer Kristi reported that supplemental donations to make up the budget shortfall have reached \$40,000, including the match, which leaves us about \$20,000 short of utilizing the entire matching pledge. If the congregation approves, the campaign will continue but the council could not move forward with hiring an associate pastor without the approval of the congregation

A motion was made to accept the budget. It was seconded and unanimously passed.

Kris Crow, Chairwoman, was called upon to report on the Children, Youth and Family Ministry Call Committee. The committee had completed the Ministry Report and submitted it to the Synod. It was published in January and the committee met with Bishop Talmadge and Pastor Mark on Monday, February 15, 2016. The next step in the process is to get recommendations from the congregation on possible candidates for our position. We found Pastor Mark from a congregational referral. Anyone that a member believes would be a good associate pastor for the church should be contacted by that member to see if they are willing to consider a call from the church and ask them to have a "ready to move document" on file with the synod. Any candidates should then be submitted to the committee. Two recent seminary graduates have already been submitted to Pastor Mark by Bishop Talmadge. Kris will

continue to give regular updates and she asks that the congregation pray for the Call Committee as the process moves forward.

Kris also reported that she and others had attended a seminar yesterday, February 20, 2016. The main subject was the drop in Sunday School attendance and in the number of confirmands. It is a crisis, but we can take advantage of that opportunity in our neighborhood given the un-churched families and the diverse demographic population. Kris hopes that we will embrace this challenge and opportunity.

President Lance brought up a proposal to amend our constitution to allow seasonal members to be voting members. The congregation had voted on the proposal once before and it was time for the second vote on the amendment. Regarding the proposal, President Lance reported that he had received an email from the ELCA in Chicago which stated in part: "Granting the power to vote to associate members is not possible. A proposed amendment has been sent to synods yesterday. If the church wide assembly approves this summer, the Grand Canyon Synod must adopt it. Since the Grand Canyon Synod has requested it, they would likely accept it." President Lance recommends that no action be taken on the second reading until the next annual meeting when we will know what the guidelines are. The ELCA is creating a voting seasonal membership but such members could not serve on the church council, could not vote by absentee ballot, and could not vote on calling or dismissing a pastor. In addition, for two consecutive months they could not vote at both churches. This would amount to creating a new classification and not amending the current meaning of associate members. A motion was made and seconded to table the proposal. It passed unanimously.

A motion was made that the congregation give special recognition to President Lance for his performance as President of the congregation, a very important role. Pastor Mark stated you can't imagine the amount of work that President Lance has put forth in working with him. President Lance

and Carol went out of their way in helping him get settled and moved into a new position. Pastor Mark would not be the pastor that he has been here without the support of President Lance. The motion was seconded and unanimously passed.

President Lance called forth existing members and newly elected members of the council. The new council will be composed of President Bob Ulland, Vice President LeeAnn Land, Treasurer Lee Stenehjem, Secretary Don Pick, and Members-at-Large Barbara Brooks, Phil Pounds and Jenny Dorsch. In an installation ceremony, the new council members affirmed their willingness to serve and the congregation affirmed its support of the new council.

President Lance thanked the new council members for their willingness to serve.

There being no further business, a motion to adjourn was made, seconded, and unanimously passed.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

What a wonderful place . . . in the world it is in which we live. We have truly been blessed as people of God. In the years that people have gathered in worship and praise of our Lord at Living Water Church, a great many things have taken place. In each and every one of these happenings God has been very present and visible in the life of Living Water Church.

There is a popular misconception among Christians that blessings from God can only be found in what we perceive to be the positive aspects of life. Nothing could be further from the truth! When we were baptized into the body of Christ, adopted as children of God, we received the promise of God's presence within our lives - not at specific times, but present in our lives always. This is important for us to understand both from a personal standpoint and a corporate standpoint, because God stands with us through thick and thin, through what we perceive to be the bad times and the good. With God's presence in our lives anything and everything is possible.

God has blessed Living Water Church in ways which we may not wholly understand nor clearly see. What we do know is the blessing we have in the people here. We are unique in the level of care and compassion that exists here - compassion that continually rises above contention and strife, a compassion that reaches out to those in need. We have been blessed with a creative and energetic following. The folks who have taken active leadership positions expend an unbelievable amount of time and energy creating and maintaining a ministry that serves all of God's people.

We have been especially blessed by God within controversy and strife. During times of greatest challenge, God's presence is never more strongly felt and the promises of God never more pertinent.

(Psalm 55:22 NRSV) Cast your burden on the LORD, and he will sustain you; he will never permit the righteous to be moved.

Our history as a congregation has demonstrated time and time again, that even in the very worst of times, God's presence not only sustains the people of God, but greatly enriches the people, too.

What a glorious ministry . . . we have found in this place. While quite often individuals have equated ministry with work, I have found it to be is not a burden, but rather another very real blessing. Ministry is God - at least in the manner in which doing the work of ministry allows people to see the presence of God in their lives. Within ministry what we find is the working of God's Holy Spirit. God's presence leading and guiding the work we do on God's behalf here in the northern Scottsdale area.

The task of ministry is something that we are called to do. Ministry is not something set aside for the man or woman who wears the funny collar or flowing robe on Sunday. Ministry is the work of God's people for God's creation. It is the task of every Christian to see that ministry is done, not just from a perspective of oversight, but in a very real and grounded way. We are called to do the work of the Lord in this time and place.

Being part of the body of Christ, being part of any congregation is not a matter of simply attending worship on a weekly basis. In being an active member of the body of Christ means that we are called to actively serve God in the areas of ministry that are set before each of us. Whether it be a call to teaching, to exceptional stewardship, to outreach, to a sharing ministry, to administration, to Word and Sacrament, to counseling, to areas of congregational service, to visitation, or any other aspect of ministry, we all have been called to serve God in a greater capacity than placing ourselves in a pew on Sunday. We have been called to something greater than to evaluate the work that everyone else accomplishes - we have been called into the service of our Lord - to do God's work - to live a life dedicated in a very visible and profound

way to offer service and honor to the Lord of our lives.

What a perfect time . . . to be part of God's family. There has been no other time in history that has been so right to do ministry. We live in a society that is more areligious than ever before. We live in the midst of a community where the unchurched vastly outnumber those who hold a church affiliation. But what there also exists is a great yearning for a greater sense of spirituality, a greater understanding and growth of the individuals' relationship with God. What a perfect time to be part of the church. In the midst of this societal quest, we have the opportunity to reach more people than ever before. Our more fundamental brothers and sisters have begun to explore the vast richness of these struggling folks - we too, ought to be doing the same.

But there's is a catch, of sorts. These folks are not part of organized religion because they see it as being very flawed. They look with a certain amount of disdain and skepticism at church professionals who wave the banner of the Gospel as folks who are out to get something for themselves. It is in the life of the committed, faithful follower that these unchurched individuals have a chance to better understand and see the benefits, blessings and joys that can be found in working with God's church on earth. But for us as a congregation to have the ability to reach out to these folks, we must have people who are willing to share the message of joy and hope that can be found at Living Water. We need to have folks who are willing to step out of their regular routine to talk and walk the story of faith with these searching souls. It is a perfect time, but the catch is that we need folks who are willing to go out and share what Living Water means to them - to share that message at work, to share that message at school, to share that message at the store or on the tennis court, golf course or hiking trail. In doing so, then and only then, will individuals searching for a better way be able to answer the question of "*what will being a member of Living Water do for me?*"

It is a time to communicate . . . the message of the love of Christ to people inside and outside the walls of this congregation. It is time to communicate that love in the action of our lives - in that which we do and that which we say to others, and about others. Communication is the key.

But solid communication must go in a couple of different directions. First and foremost, we must communicate the Gospel message of Jesus Christ. As with most things, communication means a couple of different things. This includes communicating the Gospel in what we do, in what we say, in how we act, in how we treat others, and in how we make decisions concerning the world.

In our dealings with others in our church family, it is of vital importance that we communicate with one another. Nothing can be more damaging to the relationships we have with one another than talk that takes place concerning others. In organizations such as ours, talk that criticizes, puts down, or condemns the lives and actions of another can be quite destructive. When this occurs trust is destroyed, and the ability we have to work with one another is brought to ruin. We all must be keenly aware of what we say and how that talk can affect the feelings and lives of another. The people who volunteer their time do their utmost to produce fine programs, to see that the Lord's house is kept in good order and that the ministry groups of this congregation function on a very high level. But as with all things, nothing is perfect, including the work we do. But rather spend time and energy letting people know what was not accomplished in the work they did, would it not be more beneficial if we used that time and energy to assist individuals in the tasks they sent out to do? As members of the body of Christ we have been called to be the ones who build up the community, not tear it down. We all need to be aware of the power we hold in the words we share with others.

It is a time of challenge . . . as we look forward to 2017. The challenges before us are not simply financial in nature. The challenges that lie before us are ones there facing all of Christendom. In the midst of distrust, violence and hatred that have so

violated our world, how do we continue to communicate and live the command of Christ to love. Love not just those around us, but love those who are strangers in our lives and in our world.

On the budgetary front, what our Congregation Council will present to us is not an easy budget, but one of challenge. As it was in our previous year, this was not an easy one to be put together and it will not be a budget that will be easily met. But I, along with the Council, firmly believe the presence of God's Holy Spirit in all that is done within this congregation.

The decision of the Council is one that has been Spirit led. The Council at Living Water believes that God does not challenge individuals or organizations toward the unreachable. In fact, we believe that God does not set us to a task without first equipping us with that which we need to see the task accomplished, the goal met.

As we look back . . . over 2016 it is obvious that we can see how richly the Lord has blessed us as a congregation. 2016 saw a continuing rise in our membership and new people stepping in to coordinate areas of leadership within the life of Living Water.

This past year as we strove to increase our pastoral presence in the areas of Children, Family and Youth, Living Water the Call Committee has been hard at work with the task of discerning God's call and finding an associate pastor who will help us in those specific areas of ministry, along with other areas of pastoral care and service. And, in the not-too-distant future, we may be seeing in the fruits of their labor coming forth as it appears they may be close to presenting a candidate to us to fill that position.

But not everything is new. During the past year people who have long been working at a variety of tasks have continued their grace filled work. The individuals who serve on our Ministry Teams continue to exhibit the high level of love and caring that has become a hallmark of the life of Living Water Church. The choir and praise band continue

to astound Sunday after Sunday and the educational experience not only for our children, but also for our adults, continues to climb to new heights. And I would be remiss not to mention the myriad of people who work behind the scenes to prepare us for our worship, who pay the bills, who keep things running, who ensure the facility up to date, and those who see that our worship space is tastefully and beautiful decorated.

The promise of the future . . . has seldom been stronger than it is as we enter into 2017. There are a great many challenges that lie ahead, but with everyone working together, there is not a challenge that cannot be met. I am surrounded by very caring individuals who demonstrate great passion in their specific areas of ministry. With appreciation we say goodbye to Joyce Bash, Jeri Pounds, Dave Gallimore and LeeAnn Land who have served many years as Ministry Team Leaders and are now pursuing other areas of service and we welcome Doug and Doris Yock, and Ron and Cindy Ophaug.

This year the members of Living Water have generously provided more than \$50,000 in donated and financial support. Our goal is to divide these gifts between local and global ministries. Our financial funds are received through the Hunger Jar, Wednesday night Lenten Services, and other special offerings. Living Water has distributed these funds over the past year to the following: \$3069 to the ELCA World Hunger Fund, \$902 to Vista Del Camino Food Bank, \$359 to Feed My Starving Children, \$1352 for Lunches for Learning, \$141 to LWLC Fellowship Budget, \$400 to LWLC Vacation Bible School Promotional Mailing, \$690.00 to LWLC Sunday School Program, \$350 to Grace Lutheran Church Pancake Breakfast, and \$4852 to ICM (Interfaith Cooperative Ministries). Many lives have been changed. \$6495 was given by our congregation in 2015 to apply toward the 2016 build.

HUNGER JAR – LWLC Congregation

This ministry serves as one of our greatest cash donation vehicles to be used to donate to various organizations locally and internationally. It is amazing what a penny can buy, especially when there is a full jar of them! This year we saw another upward trend in our Hunger Jar offerings. The following organizations received the benefit of your generous donations throughout 2016: ELCA World Hunger Fund, Feed My Starving Children, Vista Del Camino Food Bank, ICM (Interfaith Cooperative Ministry), and Lunches 4 Learning.

LA SAGRADA FAMILIA LUTHERAN CHURCH - Denny Dumler

Living Water supports this inner city congregation thru food contributions (grocery cart) collected from members of the congregation. The food and diapers collected are then disbursed to members in need who are served by La Sagrada Familia Lutheran Church.

LWLC BOOK DRIVE – Eric and Sue Brash

Living Water conducts an ongoing collection of new and gently used books for babies through adults. These collections are then distributed throughout the Phoenix core area by the Assistance League of Phoenix. Many of these books are chosen by Title 1 Schools K-8 students who are also being given

much-needed school uniforms and shoes. ICM Food and clothing Bank, UMOM new day centers, Desert Mission Clinics clients and Tumbleweed homeless young adults also received appropriate children's and adults' reading materials. Please remember we collect used magazines for adults; and these are appreciated by ICM Food and Clothing Bank clients. The UMOM interdenominational chapel gratefully distributes all our donated religious titles to homeless families. In 2016, the congregation (with tremendous summer support by our Vacation Bible School attendees) gathered 1534 well-received books! LUNCHES FOR LEARNING – Denny Dumler and Dave Gallimore

For the past five years we have provided support to two schools in rural Honduras that is utilized to provide food that is prepared and served to elementary age children in the schools. These gifts permit the children to attend school rather than be forced to beg for food and receive no education. The drop-out rate has historically been in the range of 80% during the first six years of their elementary education. In the schools we support, the drop-out level has dropped to under 20%. Funds come from half of the Lenten offerings and individual gifts of members outside the normal budget of our church. Our gifts are approximately \$12,500 per year and the return on the investment is the achievement of literacy for students in these two schools.

Dave Gallimore has served as the leader of this ministry thru his support as an adviser to L4L, a personal trip to Honduras for the graduations in our two schools, and his prayerful and financial support. His direct involvement thru our congregation and his home congregation in Illinois is appreciated and will be missed.

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF QUILT and KIT MINISTRY - Myrna Ulland

LWR Personal Care Kits

We did not collect and assemble LWR Personal Care Kits in 2016, as we held a school supply drive for ICM in the summer. However, we will once again focus on Personal Care Kits during Lent 2017 thru LWR's Project Promise. Personal Care Kits are shared with people who have lost everything from a natural disaster or life-threatening violence. Give hope through two bars of hand soap, a small bath towel, a toothbrush, comb, and nail clippers. Watch for our promotion!

Piece-Makers Mission Quilting

In 2016, we continued our mission quilting activity to make quilts for Lutheran World Relief (LWR). On Valentine's Day, 40 quilts were blessed before delivery to a LWR in-gathering truck in Phoenix. We also made 3 quilts for our 2016 graduating seniors! After a summer hiatus, we resumed our quilting in the autumn and are busy sewing and assembling quilts for the next LWR in-gathering in Phoenix in April 2017. As this ministry grows, we welcome donations of dollars or appropriate cotton fabric for the quilt tops or bottoms. Each quilt needs approximately 3.5 yards for each top and each bottom. The tops are pieced together by individuals and we tie them as a group. Join us anytime! Another opportunity for support is to contribute to the LWR Quilt & Kit Shipping Fund to offset costs for sending our quilts abroad. Each kit costs \$2.25 to ship. REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT PROGRAM – Vern and Rita Reamer

The Refugee Resettlement program had no activity this year, 2016, but we are ready and waiting. Our last family graduated from the program in December of 2015. This year we were asking for a small family and only larger families were coming over for assistance.

TAMALE SALES – Patty Sell

Each year the ladies of La Sagrada Familia Lutheran Church of Phoenix make tamales to sell in the community to raise money for their church. Living Water has supported their efforts in past years and 2016 was no different. In 2016, members of Living Water pre-ordered 31 dozen tamales at \$20.00 per dozen. A check for \$620 was presented to the ladies of La Sagrada.

VISTA DEL CAMINO – Doris and Doug Yock

Living Water's participation in the annual Vista del Camino Food Bank and Thanksgiving Meal Program is one way we fight hunger on a local level. Living Water gave generously again in 2016.

Together we provided 35 grocery bags, each containing a complete Thanksgiving meal. We also donated \$625 in cash and \$830 in the form of gift cards, which the Vista del Camino staff will use to purchase additional food for distribution to members of the Scottsdale community who are families or seniors in need, homeless, or otherwise experiencing crisis.

SUNDAY MORNING ADULT FORUM

We also want to thank the hospitality teams that so faithfully provide coffee and goodies for those attending the forum.

CHILDRENS' FAITH FORMATION - SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday School is in its tenth year of the Rotation Model. In this model, the same Bible story is taught for multiple weeks with the children rotating through different workshops. The workshops use a variety of teaching methods including videos, cooking, drama, art, storytelling, games, science, puppetry, computer workshops and music. Guest teachers from the congregation need only commit to one Sunday to share their special talents with our children. CONFIRMATION

Confirmation is a process of education intended to help our students better understand the depth and reality of God's promises given to them at their Baptism. In this time they begin to grasp on an ever-maturing level their Baptismal call to live and serve in Christian community. In the two years of Confirmation students participate in a series of classes, lectures, projects, meetings, and worship services that help the student better comprehend the magnitude of the promises of God, and the depth of the promises they in turn will be asked to make. Confirmation is not a requirement, it is not

a sacrament, nor is it a religious rite. Confirmation is the process that leads people to understand what they are promising their lives too, and what God has already promised to them.

The conclusion of Confirmation is marked by the service of Affirmation of Baptism. It is at this service that the students publicly proclaim their faith. It is during the service of Affirmation of Faith that the individual pledges a life of faithfulness to our Lord. This is the point and time in their lives that they claim they will now take on and accept the promises made on their behalf by their parents and godparents.

There are currently 4 students who are using the *Here I Stand* curriculum developed by the Augsburg Fortress publishing house combined with reading *The Story* a series of the essential stories of the Bible. This year classes are incorporated with our Jr/Sr High Sunday School.

WELCA – WOMEN OF THE ELCA

Living Water Lutheran continues with an active Women of the ELCA unit. As such, all women from Living Water who are involved with ministry in any way are participants of Women of the ELCA, the broad women's ministry organization of our ELCA. Every woman does not need to be involved in

every activity. Some choose only study. Others want to be kit or quilt makers, or knit prayer shawls or make dresses for children in Africa or Haiti. Some choose involvement in advocacy and justice issues, such as Human Trafficking or Native American ministry. Some want congregational service work. Some contribute financially through offerings or the Thankoffering. Some will do all of these and more. All of these affirm involvement and activity in the Women of the ELCA at Living Water Lutheran!

We gather to grow in faith and live our faith through ministry and action. In 2016, we continued our monthly Women of the ELCA Bible study from the *Gather* magazine (Sept-May) and in September, we incorporated our monthly study into the Tuesday Women's Study weekly rotation. Now, women only need to remember that Tuesday is Women's Bible Study day/evening!

FELLOWSHIP MISSION TEAM

The Fellowship Program's objective is to strengthen fellowship among congregation members, spiritually and socially, and to integrate new members into the life of the congregation in order to build mutual cooperation, trust, and enjoyment. While ministry teams in general at Living Water offer fellowship benefits, Fellowship Program teams focus on providing a range of fellowship opportunities in the form of large-scale events and smaller groups of people with a common interest or purpose, by endeavoring to create a welcoming and hospitable atmosphere for visitors and members alike on Sunday mornings and other occasions

Members of the congregation are encouraged to become involved in ongoing efforts to expand Living Water's Fellowship Program. Since smaller scale fellowship groups, such as the Bridge Group, Living Arts and Lefse Making are generally oriented toward congregation members' interests, the line-up of these interest-based activities tends to shift. For example: currently dormant Fellowship Program small groups include Little Flock Fellowship and Heavenly Hikers. Reinstatement of these and other groups, or the creation of new

endeavors, is always an option if volunteers step forward to organize activities that will enhance fellowship within the Living Water community. An array of hard-working ministry teams spearheaded efforts to offer a variety of fellowship opportunities in 2016. Descriptions of their activities appear below:

BRIDGE GROUP

GIVING MISSION TEAM

STEWARDSHIP - LARRY COUTTS

The Stewardship Program for 2016 culminated with Consecration Sunday on November 6, 2016. This included the completion and submittal of “Estimate of Giving Cards “ by members as well as a luncheon held after the second service. The luncheon was attended by approximately 100 people on a sunny afternoon. The success of the campaign can be measured by some of the highlights listed below;

- A total of 87 giving units completed “Estimate of Giving Cards” committing a total of \$351,127
- A total of 52 of those giving units increased their financial commitment above their last year’s amount
- Based on last year’s records it is expected that approximately \$93,000 will be received during the year from people who have consistent giving patterns , but whom did not return pledge cards.

- Based on average total of loose offerings, approximately \$16000 can be expected from that source
- Church income from sources such as interest, rentals, and fees is \$13000
- Based on these numbers, anticipated income for 2017 is approximately \$473,000 which is approximately a 13% increase in total giving above last year

These results exceeded this year’s goals and provide support to the Council to proceed with recent initiatives such as the call of an Associate Pastor. Subsequent to Consecration Sunday several meetings have taken place by the committee to address lessons learned from this year’s program as well as other model stewardship programs which may be considered as a guideline in the future.

ENDOWMENT - ROBERT WINTER

During 2016, the committee met a couple of times to assess the status of the “Endowment Program” as it exists at LWLC and to establish some guidelines and set some direction for 2017 and future years. In order to not interfere with other campaigns being conducted, it was determined to address the program early in 2017 via educational programs with membership to (1) identify the charter and existence of the “Endowment Program” at LWLC (2) address methods of funding and implementing an endowment program by LWLC members. These will most likely be conducted in group meetings such as “adult forum” with follow up during individual family meetings as deemed necessary .

Be it resolved that Chapter 8 of the Constitution of Living Water Living Church is hereby amended at section C8.02 to add paragraph (e) to read as follows:

C8.02(e) Seasonal members are voting members of other congregations who wish to retain such membership but desire to participate in the life and mission of this congregation, including exercising limited voting rights in this congregation. The Congregation Council may grant seasonal membership to such persons provided that this congregation is a member of a synod where the Synod Council has approved seasonal member voting on its territory. Such seasonal members shall have all the privileges and duties of voting members except that:

1) they shall not be eligible for elected office in, or membership on the Congregational Council or on a call committee of this congregation;

2) they shall not have the right to vote on any matter concerning or affecting the call or termination of call of any minister of this congregation;

3) they shall not have the right to vote on any matter concerning or affecting the affiliation of this congregation with the ELCA;

4) they shall not be eligible to serve as voting members from this congregation to the Synod Assembly or the Church

wide assembly;

5) they shall not, even if otherwise permitted by this Congregation, vote by proxy or by absentee ballot; and

6) they shall not, within any two calendar month period, exercise voting rights in this congregation and in the congregation where they remain voting members.
