A Message from Pastor Mark

105 degrees in April? And soon it will be here—summer. And we can only wonder what the temperature will be. The approach of summer is marked not so much by the beginning of the season on June 20th but by the Memorial Day weekend - and that is soon here. The space that is between Memorial Day and Labor Day are actually the days that we generally look at as the more summer-like days of the year. It is between those two weekends that most of us in Arizona try to find a way to get to cooler climates and certainly the time when our friends who visit during the winter find their way back north.

One of the things that has happened to our society since we began to view Memorial Day as the beginning of summer is a dilution of what Memorial Day is all about. With the involvement of our country in conflicts in different areas of the world over the past 20 years, we would do well to remember exactly why it is we mark the last weekend in May as such a significant time.

Memorial Day was officially proclaimed on May 5, 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11, and was first observed on May 30, 1868, when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery. The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days until after World War I (when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war). It is now celebrated in almost every State on the last Monday in May. It is the day we remember the men and woman who gave their lives for the sake of this country and for the continuing freedoms we enjoy.

May is also the month when we celebrate the lives of the women who have helped shape us with Mother's Day. Due to the continuing reality of life and death, both Mother's Day and Memorial Day can be a particularly sad times for a number of families. While many of us will be celebrating, there are people who will be facing the painful reminder that someone special to them has been lost—that a life has been taken from them.


Not all that long ago we all began to gather together in our homes, around our TVs, phones, tablets and computers, to give thanks to God for the gift of life we were given through the life, death, and resurrection of his Son, Jesus Christ. We did so not because we had to do so, we did so because we needed to offer our thanks for this beautiful and powerful gift of life.

Prayers to those who continue to find themselves in harm's way, prayers for those suffering physically or emotionally due to the pandemic, prayers for those who are recovering from the wounds of war, prayers for those who have lost someone special in their lives. And especially, prayers for those who find either of these days not times of celebrations, but times of mourning, or grief, and of loss.

During our celebrations and gatherings for Memorial Day weekend take the time that is required to pray. Take the time to say a prayer for those in peril. Take the time to say a prayer for those battling Covid-19. Take the time to pray for those who are recovering from injury. Take the time to pray for those who have lost men and women special to them. And most of all, pray that in the midst of confusion and chaos of this time, that God's presence remains with us all to lead us and guide us to a peaceful and health-filled conclusion to all the conflicts of our lives.

VBS BOOK DRIVE 2020





After beginning the 2020 school year in Honduras on a high note – announcing that we were able to invite five additional schools and 180 additional kids into the L4L program in February, we now find ourselves in uncharted territory ... like virtually everyone else on the planet.

In mid-March, around the same time similar decisions were being made in the US, Honduras went into a full lock-down because of COVID-19. Schools were immediately closed and Hondurans were asked to restrict their movements, remain at home, and observe "social distancing". While this appears to be a prudent course of action given the circumstances, our hearts are breaking for all the kids in L4L-sponsored schools who have not been receiving daily school lunches for nearly a month now. While the lockdown order continues, our options are very limited.

Soon after all Honduran schools were closed-down in March, we sent word to all school Principals at L4L-sponsored schools authorizing them to distribute all L4L food at their schools to the families of their kids. This certainly helped in the short-term, but the isolation of these remote Honduran communities has only amplified their struggle for food. Without the school lunches for their kids, these families find themselves right back in the struggle for a way to feed their families each day.

It is our sincere hope that this situation will resolve itself soon so that we can resume operations and kids can again begin receiving the daily nutrition in the L4L school lunches. We have developed a "rapid response" plan which will allow us to quickly re-supply all 46 schools in the program once schools are re-opened.

The good news is that Honduras has approximately 350 total confirmed cases of Coronavirus, and there are zero cases in the Valle Department where L4L operates. The majority of cases occurring in Honduras are in the cities of Tegucigalpa and San Pedro Sula.

Thank you for the impact your giving will again be having on these very deserving kids in the L4L program once we are able to resume operations there. Please let me know if I can answer any questions for you at any point. On behalf of the kids in Honduras ... THANK YOU!

It is our sincere hope that this situation will resolve itself soon so that we can resume operations and

kids can again begin receiving the daily nutrition in the L4L school lunches. We have developed a "rapid response" plan which will allow us to quickly re-supply all 46 schools in the program as soon as schools are re-opened.

Honduras has just recently crossed the threshold of 1,000 total confirmed cases of Coronavirus, with only one confirmed case in the Valle Department where L4L operates. The majority of cases occurring in Honduras are concentrated in the city of San Pedro Sula in the far north.

Thank you for the impact your giving will again be having on

Living Water's 24/7 office fish applauds the outpouring of support as the coronavirus impacts lives around the world.

Q. The ELCA has been helpful in guiding congregations through the coronavirus pandemic. How is it addressing the impact of COVID-19's global spread?

A. Lutheran Disaster Response is an ELCA entity that "brings God's hope, healing, and renewal to people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters in the United States and around the world." As such, it's the ELCA's engine for responding to the COVID-19 pandemic at home and abroad. Although the outbreak is unlike "conventional" disasters – e.g., floods, tornadoes, and wildfires – LDR is no stranger to providing food and hygiene kits. But this highly contagious pandemic also presents another urgent need: personal protection equipment and other medical supplies.

As the coronavirus erupted in the U.S., LDR stepped into action by helping a Lutheran church in New Orleans expand its meal program for at-risk residents. It also partnered with southern California churches involved in a social ministry delivering food and essential supplies to elderly and homebound people. By late April, LDR was also supporting relief assistance in Illinois, New Jersey, New York, Oregon, and Pennsylvania.

Overseas, LDR collaborates with various organizations in numerous locations. Programs it funds include the provision of PPE and sanitation supplies for a Jerusalem hospital, meals and hygiene kits in India, medical supplies and hygiene training in South Sudan, and PPE in Italy.

Other arms of the ELCA are helping here in Arizona. Lutheran Social Services of the Southwest continues its critical services related to in-home care, shelter for the homeless, food pantries, and meal delivery. Living Water's response is driven by the spirit of "God's work. Our hands." In April, our congregation participated in a local ELCA church's collection of funds and food for the Navajo Lutheran Mission. In May, our confirmation youth decided to help local hunger by designating \$596 from Souper Bowl Sunday to St. Mary's Food Bank, which is struggling to feed more families. Your ongoing prayers are also a powerful crisis response.
