SERVICE MISSION GROUP

The Service Mission group leads a variety of projects that provide gifts and support to people within Living Water, in our local communities, and throughout the world. The people who served as team leaders during 2020 include Eric and Sue Brash, Linda Coutts, Denny Dumler, Dave and Liz Gilkey, John and Marilyn Goesling, Ron and Cindy Ophaug, Don and Patti Pick, Patty Sell, Steve and Kristin Smith, Myrna Ulland, and Doug and Doris Yock. Sharon Westergreen has been the Council contact for the Service and Caring ministry teams.

In 2020, through Service Mission projects, members of Living Water provided generous support in the form of donated goods and financial resources outside of their annual giving. Details of these gifts are included in individual Ministry Team reports.

Funds received through the Hunger Jar, collections at Wednesday Soup Suppers during Lent, Lenten Services offerings, and Thanksgiving Eve Service offerings are outside the budget of the congregation and are disbursed each year by the Service and Caring Ministry teams.

This year, funds from these sources were lower than usual because of the suspension of in-person worship. A total of \$1,098 was collected early in 2020 and distributed to local and global ministries, as follows: From the Hunger Jar (\$227), \$113.50 was given to ELCA World Hunger Fund and \$113.50 was given to Interfaith Cooperative Ministries (ICM) Food Bank. From collections at the only Wednesday Soup Supper during Lent (\$90), \$45 was given to Vista Del Camino Food Bank (Scottsdale Community Partners) and \$45 was given to LWLC Kitchen Fellowship Supplies. From the offerings received at the only Lenten service (\$781), \$390.50 was distributed to Lunches for Learning and \$390.50

was distributed to Interfaith Cooperative Ministries (ICM) Food Bank.

In addition, funds in the amount of \$596 collected on Super Bowl Sunday were distributed to St. Mary's Food Bank. Our youth, who determine how these funds are distributed, collect them as part of the national Souper Bowl of Caring campaign (<https://souperbowl.org>), which has the goal of alleviating hunger and poverty.

▪ **“A BETTER CHANCE” DIAPER CLOSET AT ALLELUIA LUTHERAN CHURCH – Myrna Ulland**

This ministry began in 2018, to support “A Better Chance” Diaper Closet at our sister ELCA congregation, Alleluia Lutheran, in Avondale, Arizona. Unfortunately, due to the coronavirus pandemic, our annual appeal to support this ministry around Mother's Day with diapers, diaper wipes and “dollars for diapers” did not occur in 2020. The Diaper Closet at Alleluia Lutheran has remained closed throughout the pandemic. We will re-evaluate this program's needs in 2021.

▪ **ANGEL TREE – Linda Coutts**

The Angel Tree has always been an inspirational part of Advent and 2020 was no exception. We slightly lowered our angel count to 95 due to the pandemic. We were blessed to have our original hand cut wooden Angel ornaments designed and decorated by Lois Lucas and Lynda Cales and patiently cut out by Jay Lucas and Gerry Cales. Thank You! The benefit of the “Angels” go to families with children whose ages run from 3 months to 12 years. ICM (Interfaith Cooperative Ministry) Food and Clothing Bank was very excited to work with us again this year. Living Water members were asked to spend around \$40 on a toy, and/or clothing item, and an age-appropriate book for their “Angel”. How simple! ICM picks up our bags and distributes the gifts to

▪ **ELCA WORLD HUNGER – Myrna Ulland**

Living Water’s typical program support for ELCA World Hunger was generally thwarted by the 2020 coronavirus pandemic. We were able to send ELCA World Hunger a total of \$338.50, which included \$225 from donations identified for World Hunger and \$113.50 of Hunger Jar collections allocated for World Hunger. Thank you for your generosity in continuing to support this program of our national church. At this time, we are unsure about what the ELCA World Hunger emphasis might be in 2021.

▪ **GRACE LUTHERAN CHURCH HOMELESS PROJECT – Ministry Team**

We continue to regularly deliver clothing, hygiene products, shoes, and blankets to Grace Lutheran Church in support of their service to the homeless of central Phoenix. The Grace congregation and their clients are very appreciative of these donations.

▪ **GRACE LUTHERAN CHURCH PANCAKE BREAKFAST – Don and Patti Pick**

Covid-19 prevented Grace Lutheran Church from providing the Sunday morning pancake breakfast for the Phoenix homeless. This has been one of the truly great outreach ministries that LWLC annually takes part in. If you have not had the opportunity to experience this event, I invite you to volunteer when we are once again able to partake.

Even though LWLC was not able to be a part of Grace’s pancake breakfast in person, we still made a cash donation to Grace Lutheran Church. Grace continues to do Gods work with the less fortunate in Phoenix. Continue to keep their ministry not only in your prayers, but in giving clothing, water, and donations.

▪ **HABITAT FOR HUMANITY – John and Marilyn Goesling**

Living Water Lutheran Church has completed 19 houses as part of Habitat for Humanity. This year, due to the Covid virus, we were not part of any build in the Phoenix area. Normally, Living Water is responsible for both the financial and worker support. John and Marilyn Goesling coordinate these projects for Living Water. About \$23,900 was given by our congregation in 2019, by using the AZ tax credit program. This money was not used, but will be carried over for a future build. Many lives have been changed by our participation in this program.

▪ **HUNGER JAR – LWLC Congregation**

The Hunger Jar includes offerings of coins dropped into the Hunger Jar in the sanctuary during services, as well as collections during Sunday morning fellowship time. In a typical year, these offerings are a source of significant funds for gifts to local and international organizations. This year, collections were lower than usual because we were not able to worship in the sanctuary or gather in Fellowship Hall due to the pandemic. We were able to send funds that had been contributed by the end of the first quarter, amounting to \$227, to the ELCA World Hunger Fund (\$113.50) and to St. Mary’s Food Bank (\$113.50). We look forward to renewed giving to the Hunger Jar sometime in 2021.

▪ **LA SAGRADA FAMILIA LUTHERAN CHURCH FOOD SHELF– Ministry Team**

Members of Living Water continue to donate food items for the emergency food bank maintained by La Sagrada Familia for people in need among those it serves.

- **LA SAGRADA FAMILIA LUTHERAN CHURCH TAMALES SALE – Steve and Kristin Smith**

This year's tamale sale was another one for the books: Diana from La Sagrada Familia notified me they would do tamales as a Christmastime fundraiser on the Friday just one week and a day before their planned delivery. So, in a nutshell (or a cornhusk, as it were?): We requested the same number as last year, 48 dozen, and announced the sale in an email blast from the Living Water office. Around half of the tamales were reserved by members during the week prior to delivery day. We sold all but 4 dozen at a price of \$20 each after the outdoor worship service on Sunday, December 6. The remaining 4 dozen were sold during the week. In addition to the sale proceeds, we received cash donations of \$120, for a total of \$1,080 for La Familia. Thanks to volunteers Myrna Ulland, Darrell Shipley, and Sally Harris, for their help to make tamale pick-up go smoothly on Sunday, and also to Myrna for meeting Padre Miguel at Living Water on Saturday afternoon, and organizing the tamales in the Fellowship Hall refrigerator. Also thanks to Pastor Mark for encouragement to proceed, and to Jennifer for email blasts, taking reservation orders, and helping to coordinate with me.

- **LUNCHEES FOR LEARNING – Denny Dumler**

For the past eight years, LWLC has sponsored two schools in rural Honduras for children and their families in the elementary school years that will work to reverse the cycle of poverty that has existed for many years. With many of the families living on less than \$2 per day, children have been forced to beg for food for their families, suffered with malnutrition with lack of food, and forced to drop out of school without a basic education. The program has been in existence since 2005 and now serves 46 schools in the Valle Region of Honduras. During this time, dropouts have been

reduced to nearly zero and steps toward reversing the cycle of poverty have occurred.

However, 2020 impacted this area of the world in several significant ways. Like the rest of the world, COVID 19 has forced the schools and the food deliveries to be halted and the country has experienced two major hurricanes that have further had major negative impacts on the children of the region. The school year is from February thru November and we are planning to begin the program again as the school year begins in February. It will be a significant effort to regain the success we have experienced in the past but it is clear the need is greater than ever.

We have funded our support for the two schools with gifts from members and friends and thru a portion of the offerings during the Lenten season. With no services during Lent 2020, these funds have been significantly reduced and thru loss of several members, we are in need of additional support from members and friends. We are not requesting any funding from our normal congregational budget but hope to continue to support thru special gifts given specifically designated to L4L.

- **LUTHERAN SOCIAL SERVICES SW REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT PROGRAM – David and Liz Gilkey**

In August of 2019, with the help of a Lutheran Social Services moving truck, two excellent movers and some friends of ours, we resettled a family from Kenya into a nice duplex. The family is made up of a mother, two teenage sons and an eight year old daughter. All of the donated furniture and household items were utilized.

The LWLC storage unit is now filled to near capacity. We are so thankful for the caring and generosity of this congregation for all their donations of household items and furniture. While we did not set up a home for a refugee family in 2020, this year we look forward to making a family's transition to this country

and each quilt includes a “pocket” attached to the back of the quilt, secured at the top with Velcro. Quilts also include a stitched-on blank nametag stating the quilt was “made with love.” Children typically arrive at a foster children’s shelter with no personal items. The child’s name is written on the quilt nametag as they receive their quilt. Beyond the quilt being a symbol of caring, the pocket on the quilt allows the child to safely retain any personal care items. Quilters from Living Water joined up with quilters from a sister ELCA congregation, Ascension Lutheran in Paradise Valley. In 2020, 35 pocket pal quilts were contributed from Living Water.

▪ **THANKSGIVING FOOD DRIVE (Vista Del Camino) – Doris and Doug Yock**

Living Water’s participation in the annual Thanksgiving Meal Program sponsored by the Vista del Camino Food Bank is one way we fight hunger on a local level. In 2020, to minimize person-to-person contact, we did not collect food items. Instead, we encouraged gifts in the form of checks and gift cards. Living Water gave generously, donating \$1,925 that was used by the Vista Del Camino staff to purchase complete Thanksgiving meals for distribution to members of the Scottsdale community who are families or seniors in need, homeless, or otherwise experiencing crisis. Thank you for your generosity and kindness!



LEARNING MISSION GROUP

Learning Mission’s purpose is to assist all ages, from three years to the third chapter of life, to grow in their faith and relationship with Christ and one another through the development and leading of learning opportunities and experiences. Our emphasis is to equip

individuals to live out the mission of God in a changing world. Study of the scriptures is an important part of our faith formation as young people begin to learn who Jesus is, prepare for confirmation, and for adults as we continue our faith journey. 2020 brought us unique challenges in our Learning Ministry areas. We’re grateful to all the leaders who have been so creative, adaptive and faithful in their dedication, passion for, and involvement with our unique learning opportunities at Living Water this past year.

▪ **SUNDAY MORNING ADULT FORUM/ADULT EDUCATION**

We are grateful to the presenters and to all who attended and supported the Adult Forum hour between services on Sunday mornings from January until the pandemic shut everything down in mid-March!

During the first months of 2020, topics and presenters included the following:

1. Several “ask a pastor” sessions, open forums with pastor panelists Gene Perry, Dennis Nelson, and Jim Hanson.
2. Gene Perry presented a report on Jan. 19 from our strategic planning discussion in late 2019.
3. Larry Carr presented a session on “Biblical Origins” on Jan. 26.
4. Bishop Deborah Hutterer moderated an “Ask the Bishop” session on Feb. 2.
5. Jim Hanson led discussion on Feb. 23, “Christianity as a Criminal Enterprise.”
6. Larry Carr continued a second of his presentations on “Biblical Origins” on March 1.
7. Pr. Mark led discussion on “Word of God” on March 8.

Then Covid-19 arrived and all future in-person presentations were, of course, cancelled. Myrna Ulland provided a virtual presentation on Women in Church Leadership on March 18th. Larry Carr followed with another virtual

presentation on Stewardship on March 25. And lastly, Rev. Bob Hutson presented virtually on the Lord's Prayer, titled "Our Father" in early April.

In addition to the Sunday Morning Adult Forum, Pr. Gene Perry led a six-week adult education study on "Genesis" on Monday mornings, using the theme of "unfolding the Biblical story." This study began on Feb. 3rd.

The pandemic created a new opportunity for adult education at Living Water in the form of weekly online Bible Studies presented by retired ELCA pastor, Dennis Nelson. Pr. Nelson continued his Lenten study series in a virtual format beginning on March 18, and has faithfully continued each week since then, bringing us an in-depth reflection of the lessons for the upcoming Sunday. Dennis' presentations are enhanced with a PowerPoint and graphics created by his wife, Terry, and have been a gift to many each week.

The 2020 Adult Forum/Adult Education ministry team included Ken Bash, Gene Perry, Rita Reamer, Larry Carr, Myrna Ulland, and Pr. Rossman. We were saddened to learn of Rita's death later in the year. Retired Pastor Steve Cornils assisted us in early 2020 for a short period of time. We're thankful for the involvement of both Rita and Pr. Steve.

▪ FAMILY SUNDAY SCHOOL 2020

From January through mid-March 2020, Family Sunday School continued in our traditional in-person mode. We continued to use "Whirl," a Bible-centric curriculum designed for kids ages 3 through 6th grade based on the revised common lectionary. Janice Moore taught the K-4 graders, Heidi Ruff taught the 5-6 graders, and Patty Hamm led music in a combined K-6 welcome session. While the kids seemed to enjoy the content, we struggled with low attendance on Sunday mornings. We began to wonder if the success seen in our high participation in our 2019 Christmas Pageant and our new Wave program

might be difficult to translate into participation in the current Sunday School format. Did we need to change format/something? That discussion would have to wait as in mid-March, we ceased our Family Sunday School program due to Covid-19.

In September, a small leadership group of Pastor Shari, Kris Crow, and Heidi Ruff formed to create an online Family Sunday School experience. We released our first video on September 13. From Sept 13, 2020 through January 3, 2021, we have released a video/lesson every week with much positive support from our congregation and families. We are averaging 55 views per week. Our main goal in each video is to teach the children about Jesus and the Biblical witness and to also continue to build community and relationships even through the medium of video delivery. We've done this by trying to include in our videos different learning modes and, importantly, including submissions of videos and pictures from the children as well as LWLC adults. We believe that we create community when the children send in video and pictures of their experience of Sunday School at home and we use that in future videos. We are learning as we go! Thus far we have completed three series within the Family Sunday School video program: An 8-week series titled, "Who is Jesus" (Sept 13 – Nov 1), a 2-week series on Confirmation (Nov 8- Nov 15), and a 7-week series focused on Advent and Christmas (Nov 22 – Jan 3).

In the crazy year of 2020, delivering Family Sunday School via video with the help of so many in our congregation has been a joy. A HUGE thank you for the support and participation of so many people who have graciously helped us by recording videos of themselves to include as segments in our Sunday School lessons, including Julie Ann Walker, Denny Dumler, Myrna Ulland, Patty Hamm, Scott Sims, Michael Winter, Barbara Brooks, Joan Sprinkle, Marcy Donavon, Linda Coutts, Cindy Ophaug, John Goesling, Jill Wehr, Sam Winters,

Aubrey Coutts, Lily and Davis Shelmire, and Pastor Mark. We give thanks for the leadership and guidance provided by Pastor Shari and Kris Crow each week. We are so blessed that in this format we have a wonderful lesson introduction from Pastor Shari each week. And Kris Crow brings excitement and her vast talents to each and every lesson. Importantly, we are so very thankful for each child and family that watches the video lessons and sends in a Bible verse, prayer, or picture of his/her experience of God that week. Praise God!

We grow in our knowledge of scripture and in friendship and support with the depth of the prayers and conversation that occur each week. In Jan. and Feb. 2020, we completed an 8-session study from N.T. Wright and Michael Bird, "The New Testament You Never Knew." The 4-session Winter/Spring study from the Gather magazine on vocation, "We Are Called," written

by Rev. Dr. Kit Kleinhans, was interrupted a bit when the pandemic arrived, but we regrouped via Zoom to complete it! Zoom allowed women to participate from several states! From April through early June, we studied a book from Episcopal Priest Barbara Brown Taylor, "Holy Envy." In June, we used the 3-session summer study from the Gather magazine titled "Just Love," written by Rev. Christa Compton and Rev. Gladys Moore. This study examined the relationship between love and justice. Following a summer hiatus, September brought us to Max Lucado's 5-session study on "Anxious for Nothing: Finding Calm in a Chaotic World" which seemed appropriate for our circumstances! Following that, the Fall Gather study on "Holy Time," written by Pr. Meghan Johnston Aelabouni, took us through 3 weeks together. Aelabouni is currently the Country Coordinator for YAGM in Jerusalem and the West Bank. We closed out the year with another Lucado study for 6 weeks, "You Are Never Alone." We concluded the year on Christmas week with a time for prayer and reading of the Nativity story from Luke.

In addition to studying together, we continue to reach out financially through our weekly offerings. In addition to gifts to support our Grand Canyon Synod Women's Organization, we've supported St. Mary's Food Bank, the Navajo Lutheran Mission, and Lutheran World Relief. In December, we again helped make Christmas special for six adult women from Scottsdale's Via Linda Senior Center "adopt-a-senior" holiday program.

It's a joy to be among the Tuesday Women who so lovingly share their wisdom, their laughter, their tears, and their hearts with one another as we learn together.

I close with a phrase used by Muslims in greeting/asking how they're doing. It translates to "things are a little hard right now, but in all circumstances, praise belongs to God." This seems appropriate as we continue into this

pandemic time, doing our best to continue to grow in faith and friendship on Tuesdays through technology!

Living Water Lutheran continues with an active Women of the ELCA unit and we represent the women's ministry arm of our ELCA under a broad umbrella. We commit to the purpose of Women of the ELCA: As a community of women, created in the image of God, called to discipleship in Jesus Christ, and empowered by the Holy Spirit, we commit ourselves to grow in faith, affirm our gifts, support one another in our callings, engage in ministry and action, and promote healing and wholeness in the church, the society, and the world.

- A leadership team has been formed under the Women of the ELCA umbrella. The first action we took was to rename

our women's ministry "LWLCW" – indicating Living Water Lutheran Church Women. At Living Water, ministries involving women are found in many mission teams and projects and that is a good fit for our congregation, including Bible study, quilting ministry, fellowship teams, prayer shawls, writing ministry and liturgical arts. We gather to grow in faith and live our faith through ministry and action. There's a place for all women at Living Water in our mission and ministries.

- In 2020, we continued to incorporate the Bible study from the Gather magazine into the Tuesday Women's Study weekly rotation. Now, women only need to remember that Tuesday is Women's Bible Study day! All offerings/gifts directed to WELCA have been forwarded on to our Grand Canyon Synod women's organization.
- The pandemic closed all in-person local and regional women's gatherings beginning in March, including a postponement, and now cancellation, of the national 11th Triennial Gathering of ELCA women planned for Phoenix in August.
- In November, women from Living Water again participated in our annual "Thankoffering," an offering to support ministries of Women of the ELCA across our entire church wide organization. Thank you!
- On behalf of LWLCW, we look forward to new opportunities to engage and support women of all ages in their faith journey.

- **VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL (VBS)**

Our journey for 2020 VBS began in December by selecting our VBS curriculum focused on the theme "Wilderness Escape – Where God Guides and Provides." The first meeting of the VBS Leadership Team was held in February. We were oblivious to the impending pandemic and its impact on our ministries. Then in March, everything stopped as we began to shelter in place. In early April we faced a decision point - Should we cancel VBS and plan big for 2021? Should we delay it until the end of the year?

Pastor Mark suggested pursuing a "virtual" or "online" version of VBS. On April 28, the VBS Leadership Team regrouped via a Zoom meeting and we were off and running with unanimous support to move forward. Everyone on the team stepped up to take on a segment of the program and we strong armed Scott Sims to play the role of Moses and James Bernau to lead the Games segment. Finally, Erik Laudenschlager agreed to film and edit the 5 days of content.

The web site was changed to reflect our new approach, emails and postcards went out to previous attendees and the banner was put out in front of the church. Despite the fatigue from online school, 58 children from 36 families were registered for our VBS program by the time the registration process closed!

We dusted off the VBS set created in 2014 and started filming the five days of video content on May 21 while simultaneously creating a 29 page Parent Pack and gathering daily supplies needed for crafts, games and the Family Mission Project for each family. By June 10, boxes with supplies were shipped to 9 out of state families and the supplies for the remaining 27 local families were delivered to their doorsteps. On June 15, Day 1 of Virtual VBS premiered on our website and YouTube channel. The week concluded with a "Drive Thru" Ice Cream Social in the church parking lot. With the VBS songs blaring, we safely distributed sealed cups of ice cream,

spoons and napkins to carloads of our VBS families.

This year's VBS would not have happened without the contributions of time, creativity and talent shared by the following committed leaders:

▪ **LWLC SAFETY AND SECURITY COMMITTEE**

In prior years, based on local events, FBI alerts and common sense, the LWLC Council approved the establishment of a Safety and Security Committee, to determine risks to the Church and its Members and develop appropriate countermeasures.

We had a survey conducted by the American Society for Industrial Security (ASIS) Houses of Worship program, had two consultations with the Scottsdale Police Department and several estimates by companies providing Closed Circuit Television Security systems. We conferred with

two Directors of Security of large Churches in Scottsdale to seek their advice and recommendations on establishing a program for LWLC. Additionally, two members of the Safety and Security Committee attended a Southwest Church Safety and Security Summit at a Scottsdale Church Campus to learn best practices for establishing a program for LWLC.

With the consent of the Church Council we have purchased additional first aid/trauma kits placed in the church campus, obtained training material and equipment to train members of the Safety and Security team, purchased and had installed a CCTV system to monitor events on the exterior of our church campus.

The COVID crisis and limitations on church campus activities has limited our ability to recruit and train a Safety and Security Team, but we are postured and ready to take common sense measures to protect our Church Staff, Members and Campus.

▪ **SERVANT TEAMS**

The SERVANT TEAM LEADERS fill a tremendous role at Living Water Church. They serve, lead, and oversee the many duties before, during and after our two worship services on Sunday. We try to involve as many of our year around worshippers, new members and snowbirds.

We also make every effort to include our younger people, Jr. and Sr. High youth, to participate in the variety of duties of servants. They are energetic and we are excited to have them serve. We have 8 Worship Leadership spots assigned to a Sunday of the month to lead.

Their leadership duties include overseeing and directing the servants for duties that day. The signup sheets are located on the circular kiosk in the Narthex for leaders to use for any given Sunday they are available. Any empty spots are up to the leaders to fill. If leaders are unable to

make their assigned Sunday, it is their responsibility to trade with another leader and inform Jennifer the Living Water Office Manager of the change.

The servants are listed each Sunday in the bulletin. Greeting, ushering, assisting with communion, are the mainstays of our Sunday worship services. Should there be a baptism, reception of new members, the celebrations of Thanksgiving, Christmas, Lent and Easter, leaders are asked to be prepared to serve.

Each Worship Leader is trained, insightful, and capable in assisting with emergencies, the elderly, babysitting needs, directions to the bathroom area, location of the educational building, and any other pertinent information. At the beginning of each service, a water bottle is given to first time visitors with our Living Water information tucked inside.

A beautiful bell was purchased for servant team members to ring in the courtyard five minutes before the 8:30 and 10:45 service. The bell has a wonderful welcoming sound to remind those in attendance that our worship service is about to begin.

All leaders are asked to mentor those that could possibly fill a leadership role and build potential leaders for the future. We have had one or two training sessions for new servants, but generally we train "on the job" when someone wants to serve in any of the capacities mentioned...we serve with them the first few services so they understand protocol.

Our Sunday Worship leaders for 2019/2020: Deb Bash / Debbie Anderson, Gene & Dee Eilers, (1st Sunday of the month). DJ and Jan Johnson, Don and Patti Pick, (2nd Sunday of the month). Lee and Sue Stenehjem, Darryl and Tana Harlan, (3rd Sunday of the month). Denny Dumler, Charles & Sue Boyd / Ed & Darryl Shipley (4th Sunday of the month).

Should there be a 5th Sunday in any month, we ask who is available on the team to step up and lead.

Around mid-May we ask all leaders to meet at the Johnson home to "review the year" with open discussion, make necessary changes to our structure if needed. It is also a time for fellowship and we enjoy supper together.

For summer worship (June, July & August) Living Water moves to one service at 9:30am. Leaders are asked to sign up for dates on a calendar of the Sundays they can lead.

March of 2020, Covid forced our worship location to the courtyard. The structure stayed the same but outside and inside cars because of Covid. The Christmas services for 2020 were handled in that manner.

Effective in December of 2020, Darnell and Donna Pettengill will lead the servant teams moving forward.


▪ SPECIAL SERVICES
